Weddings these days come in all sizes and shapes. For many, a wedding is a guiet, simple ceremony, while others spare no expense to create an experience their friends and family will remember forever. Regardless of the trappings, weddings share one thing in common: union. Two additional words can be used to describe a solid marriage.

- 1. Discontinuity. When a man and woman get married, they break the ties with those who constituted their dominant family prior to the wedding.
- **2. Continuity.** The couple continues a magnificent institution called family. It's not the same as the one they are disconnecting from, but it continues the same principle of family.

God calls this union a covenant. Because the nature of a covenant is spiritually binding, honoring the marriage relationship is especially important. Unfortunately, our world and culture has been playing fast and loose with this covenant, and people are trying to redefine what a marriage is and what that commitment entails. God made His standard clear in the Ten Commandments, Obedience to God's commandment carries God's blessing, but as we see in the life of David, failing to honor God's standard of marriage brings devastating consequences.

Day One EPHESIANS 5:22-24

When Paul wrote to the Ephesian church, he first addressed the wives. He said that wives are to live in submission to their husbands "as to the Lord." This language isn't comfortable for a lot of people. Nonetheless, it is what the Bible teaches, and we need to understand that not only does God have a purpose for everything He's spoken through His Word, but further, that it all serves for our good and His glory. The reason wives are called to submit to their husbands is that it serves as a powerful illustration of the church's submission to Christ. In a world where people are naturally prideful, a humble wife who honors her husband stands out powerfully against the norm. And when she shares the reason she lives this way—because she desires to reflect Christ to others in her life—God will use her testimony to reveal Himself to the world.

Why is the idea of submission so difficult for many to accept?

How does a wife's submission reflect the church's relationship to Jesus?

Day Two **EPHESIANS 5:25**



As difficult as submission may be for some wives, listen to what Paul said to the husbands—"love your wives, just as Christ loved the church." Every husband today would say he loves his wife. In fact, as a part of the marriage ceremony, he pledges his undying love for her. However, I don't think I've ever met a husband who would boldly claim that he loves his wife in all the ways Jesus loved the church. Let's think of the ways Jesus showed His love. Jesus devoted His time to teaching, healing, and providing for needs, often to the point of being totally exhausted. Jesus served His disciples continually, and even though He was the teacher, He demonstrated His humility through washing their feet. Ultimately, Jesus showed His love by giving His life on the cross, enduring the punishment for the sins of His people. Though no husband has ever loved his bride as much as Jesus loved His people, every husband is called to this.

Day Three **EPHESIANS 5:26-27**

The reason that husbands are called to love their wives is the same reason that Jesus loved the church—to make her holy before the Lord. Of course, there's nothing any husband can do to provide spiritual cleansing for his bride. However, husbands are called to lead their wives (who are called to submit to their leadership) in a wholehearted pursuit of God. Though the husband isn't the one who cleanses her, he is called to put her in the position that God would be at work in her life. Jesus devoted Himself to ministering to the church, so we could be made righteous before God. In the same ways, husbands are to live diligently and sacrificially, leading their wives in pursuing Christ, so they would be holy and blameless.

How did Jesus make the people of God holy and spotless?

How is a husband responsible to make his wife holy and blameless before God?

Day Four **EPHESIANS 5:28-31**

In Genesis, we read that when God created woman, their relationship was described as being "one flesh" (v. 24). This means that a husband is to love his wife so much that the things he would naturally desire for himself, he wants for her just as much. In fact, in loving her as Christ does, a husband would naturally put her first. Their connection is so deep—relationally, emotionally, physically, and spiritually—that they are one. Several times in the New Testament, those who belong to the church are spoken of as members of the body of Christ (Rom. 12:5; 1 Cor. 12:27). The oneness that exists between a husband and wife serves as a picture of a believer's unity with Christ, and all believers are called to cultivate a relationship with Christ that is as close as the most intimate marriage.

What does it mean that a husband and wife are one flesh?

How does this reflect our relationship with Christ?

Day Five **EPHESIANS 5:32**



A mystery refers to something that is difficult, or even impossible, to explain, and for a long time marriage wasn't fully understood by the people of God. Throughout history, from the time God married Adam and Eve and up until the time of Paul, people thought marriage was about a man and a woman. After all, this makes perfect sense. Except that this wasn't ultimately what God intended. Whereas marriage truly is a great blessing to the husband and wife, as well as the children and even society at large, God's ultimate purpose for marriage was that it would serve as a picture of Jesus' relationship with the church. Through marriage, we not only have the blessing of sharing life within the closest of human relationships, but we also have the blessing of reflecting Christ to the world around us.
